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
What is Public Health?

Health Department Budgets: GGIA

• General Grant-In-Aid (GGIA)


- Provided by the state to the counties to allow expansion of the provision of services
- Is not intended to replace local funding

Programmatic Grant-In-Aid (PGIA)

- Money intended for specific programs (e.g., MCH, EP)
- Given to the state from the federal government
- Some reductions have occurred

Implemented October 2011







Health Department Budgets

 Typical Health Department Funding


- **GGIA funding** [20-40%]

- Fees (minimal and variable) [20-50%]




Lamar County Health Department Grant-in-Aid 2010-2014

Key Factors



- Local health departments are the "best kept secret" unless there is a major event
 - Facilities work diligently and quietly to keep their community healthy and safe
- Core services are threatened with the risk of more extensive budget cuts
- A general sense of poor health in the community affects overall economic viability of the community
